
THE PARISH AS ONE BODY

Page Three A NOTE FROM FR. MIKE PONTARELLI, O.S.M. December 30, 2018



For the many years I was a rent-a-priest at Holy Family Cathedral, I enjoyed this feast. It's the patronal feast of the first cathedral of the Diocese of Orange. When Christ Cathedral is dedicated, July 17, 2019 (the Feast of the Founding of Disneyland) Holy Family will be called the Pro Cathedral. Holy Family continues to give me a boost and passion. I'm not sure why. It just might be that I am an only child, my father died when I was young and my mother raised me as a Messiah!

Holy seems to be a mis-placed adjective to put before family. Broken, divorced, separated, split, mixed, or the favored "dysfunctional" are more currently used to describe the feast called "Holy Family." The philosopher Fredrick Nietzsche urged doing away with the Holy Family as a model; it's just too magnanimous; it causes problems because we are unable to live up to its measure.

The Feast of the Holy Family asks us to ponder the truth that Joseph, Mary, and Jesus were really not that much different from any family in their or even our own neighborhood. I sincerely doubt that they knelt all day chanting psalms. They certainly did not pray the "Hail Mary" or even the "Our Father" together. They certainly didn't bow to each other as we do to statues of saints. Like us and our neighbors on a good day, they had to get on with the unavoidable distractions of everyday living; so much so that the child, the Christ child at that, could be misplaced in a caravan. No ordinary kid getting lost in a store or mall, Mary and Joseph lost the Savior of the world. Can you imagine? And he wasn't found eating an ice-cream cone waiting for his parents to answer a store wide page.

Can you imagine Jesus as a perfectly normal kid? Jesus stayed behind seemingly uncaring about whatever worry his choice-at-the-time would cause his parents. Like all other normal kids, he was overly eager to run faster, jump higher,

ride a bigger bike, mount even larger horses, and get started with the work he was born to do. And what of the response of Mary and Joseph? Not different from your own - on a good day. Just about the time you want to whale the tar out of your kid, you hug him as if you'll never let him out of your sight ever again! Can you imagine?

Maybe that is the point. Can you imagine? Joseph is a very tractable man; easy mannered enough to be a model husband, but no patsy. Mary, the model wife and mother, whose personality and character influenced her son. Jesus, the human child. They had to look at the challenges each offered to the other, person-to-person as we all do. As happens in every family; "They did not understand what he (the child) said to them...his mother kept all these things in her heart. Jesus grew in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and men." (Luke 2:50-52)

It's not a bad idea to talk to Mary and Joseph once in a while about your family, especially about the kids. They didn't understand their child either. And that child – like all children - wasn't the child of their parents' dreams, but a child of their love. And the yielding of that true love requires us to keep reaching in all kinds of unexpected directions. But love and yielding and the unforeseen are what keep life invigorating. Can you imagine the child of your love not your dreams, and yielding to the unforeseen but perfectly known to the child? It is love that makes the family holy, for love is of God, – yield to the love of God within your family and be Holy Families this year. God Bless!



Once more thank you for all your kindnesses and generous gifts to me this time of year. Thank you for your service to our community – Celia Gerish and your friends, the church is simply beautiful! Thank you, God bless you!

COMMENTARY ON TODAY'S GOSPEL

Today's Gospel is taken from the "infancy narrative" section of Luke. It is helpful to note the very carefully crafted nature of the stories he recounts here. Under the guise of narrating historical events, Luke is actually engaged in a profound theological reflection on the nature and person of Jesus Christ. From the perspective of his vantage point many years after the life and death of Jesus, and certainly inspired by the Christian community's faith in Jesus as the risen Son of God, Luke is able to weave a narrative of his early years in a way that reveals to the astute reader all that will unfold more clearly later on in the course of the Gospel story of his public ministry, death, and resurrection.

The heart of this story is Jesus' pronouncement that he "had to be" in his Father's house. The phrase "had to be" is a favorite expression of Luke's to signal the inevitability of a destiny tied irrevocably to God's saving plan for the world. Jesus reveals his special relationship to God as his Father, a relationship that surpasses any human ties to Mary or Joseph. His is a transcendent identity from the beginning. The fact that he was drawn to the temple, to his "Father's house," carried with it a pregnant meaning that will be more fully realized in the Gospel proper, where Luke tells the story of Jesus' great journey to Jerusalem, the place where the events of his paschal mystery are to be played out. His identity and his mission are both foreshadowed in this scene as he "preaches" in the temple, only to have his message (and person) meet with amazement and astonishment.

Reflection

One of the all-time great Christmas movies is *It's a Wonderful Life!* The classic scene is the final one. The townspeople are gathering in George Bailey's living room. They're pouring money onto a table, all with the intention of rescuing George from financial ruin. It's not long before George's brother enters the picture. Having heard of the hard times George had been going through, he secured a leave from the military, hopped a plane, and flew all day and night to make it to Bedford Falls. He wanted to be of help. Seeing the people and the mountain of money, he raises his glass and toasts his brother: "To my brother George, the richest man in the world!"

George Bailey was rich, all right, but not because he was suddenly given money. He was rich because he had family and friends who loved him and cared about him. There's much to be said for the benefits and blessings of family. Copyright © 2003, World Library Publications. All rights reserved.

JEAN M. TWENGE, PHD - SPEAKING AT ST. JULIANA JAN 2019

The iGen is the first generation to spend their entire childhood in the age of the smartphone, and this fact alone seems to have an important impact on who they are and how they relate to the world. More than previous generations, they are obsessed with safety, focused on tolerance, and have no patience for inequality. They are also "on the brink of the worst mental health crisis in decades."

In this lively talk on January 13 and 14 at our St. Juliana Parish Center we will explore the idea that iGen may be growing up more slowly than previous generations. Also, learn what practical tools may be utilized to best meet the developmental needs of children and encourage their independence and autonomy.

ABOUT THE SPEAKER

Jean Twenge, Ph.D, is a professor of Psychology at San Diego State University and the author of more than 140 scientific



publications and books, including iGen: Why Today's Super-Connected Kids Are Growing Up Less Rebellious, More Tolerant, Less Happy-and Completely Unprepared for Adulthood. Dr. Twenge frequently gives talks and seminars on teaching and working with today's young generation based on a dataset of 11 million young people. Her research has appeared in The Atlantic and The New York Times (to name a few) and she has been featured on the Today Show, NBC Nightly News, Fox & Friends, NPR and CNN.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITIONS

Today's feast is new as feasts go, and it sets us this year in a very modern crisis. Amid conflicting schedules and commitments, a young man, testing the limits, has strayed from his parents and gone off to the big city. Mary and Joseph search frantically, only to find the child Jesus in the temple, conversing with the elders and scholars of the law, who are amazed at his wisdom.

In the time of Jesus, the temple was the religious center of Jewish ritual. Outside of Jerusalem, people gathered in the synagogues, centers of learning, for daily prayer and study. Still, everyone longed to journey to the temple to participate in the offerings, and to fulfill certain obligations of the law that could only be done there. On this feast, we catch a glimpse of the family of Jesus: parents dealing with the normal stresses of raising a child, and yet completely grounded in the ways of faith and tradition.

There has always been an appreciation in Christianity for the value of pilgrimage--the journey to holy places that is a symbol of our life's journey to God, and a sense of connection to important events in our family history. During the Christmas season, many of us undertake pilgrimages to the family homestead for festival meals, to the parishes where we were formed in the faith, or perhaps even to a beautiful manger scene or festival of lights. There are few better days than this in our calendar for spending time with the family, especially on a short pilgrimage to a favorite place. Just make sure that no one gets left behind!

THE OCTAVE OF CHRISTMAS



"Octave" comes from the Latin word for "eight," and since eight is one step beyond seven, the number of days in a week, it has long been seen as a symbol of perfection, completion, and new beginnings. Early Christians called Sunday the "eighth day," since it was the day after the Sabbath and a day of resurrected life, the Lord's Day. By the seventh century, people regarded the eight days after Easter Sunday as one great day, an octave, one glorious feast when people were forbidden to fast or kneel. In the seventh century, Pentecost acquired an Octave, too. Christmas didn't claim the honor of a continuous feast, but it did get an Octave Day. January 1 is the oldest Marian feast, the Octave of Christmas. It was originally a feast of the motherhood of Mary, although for centuries until 1969 it was called the Feast of the Circumcision. Our reformed calendar follows the earlier tradition of celebrating Mary as Mother of God.—James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.
